As you read the answers, take note of the children's ages. While only a few years apart, a shift from an external and object-based focus or line of thinking to a more emotional or attitude-based understanding of the concept of love takes place. Love, and the understanding of our experience of love, is something we grow into. In our early years love is about things, but as we grow and our brains develop, love is about experiences, memories, and attitudes.

Look at the answers of the five-year-olds. Within just a few years, children start to show an understanding of what a demonstration of love is. Not only should we be creating moments with our kids that will reinforce their understanding of love, but we also need to encourage and model what love is for them.

Nicholas' answer is the most telling, isn't it? Love is about being present with one another. God is love. God is with us in a way that is beyond our understanding, but not beyond our experience. As we look into the faces of our loved ones, let us remember that we are looking at the face of God. God came to us embodied as a baby in a manger. God continues to come to each of us embodied in our loved ones, strangers, and as anyone who offers us love and grace and forgiveness.

May we continue to experience God's love in new and profound ways and may we let God's love be embodied in us!

I'm searching for a squatty-six, a big foot lower right with a slanty top, and a little dinker with a black line crossing it. I wish you could help me find them, but this is my own burden, and let me tell you - IT IS A BURDEN! There has to be a lost piece! This one HAS to fit here! Who ever invented jigsaw puzzles must have either had a warped sense of humor or came up with the idea to torture prisoners during the Spanish Inquisition!

This all started with a quick train ride into downtown Chicago from my daughter's house. I wanted to breathe in the wonder of the Chicago Institute of Art - one of my favorite places in the world. Standing in front of Georges Seurat's "Sunday on La Grande Jatte" is worth the whole trip - the whole wall covered in one huge painting all done with little points of color that you can't see until your nose almost touches the canvas. Hopper's lonely diner in "Nighthawks" changes your mood to darkness and loneliness - and then you step into the Impressionist's rooms - and your mind can barely take in all of the color and splendor! Monet's lily pads and Renoir and his vivid bright hats in the "Two Sisters (On the Terrace)" make you stand and soak up the beauty. Thomas Hart Benton and his cool Art Deco style. Winslow Homer and his daring ocean scenes ensure that I'll never go fishing in a rowboat on the ocean, and the John Singer Sargent portraits - so wonderful they make me emotional! I really can't see how anyone cannot be swept away with all of this wonder and beauty!

But it's not a complete trip to any museum without a trip to the gift shop! I had to find some way of bringing that special place home with me. Maybe a refrigerator magnet or a print of a favorite painting. But, oh, why not a jigsaw puzzle - a perfect snowy day project. Something Jacque and I can do together! So many to choose from! A Monet or the famous Hopper diner, or how about Van Gogh self-portrait. Nah - they all look way too hard and too big. In a moment of weakness, I finally pulled out Van Gogh's "Bedroom at Arles" (you've all seen it!) - that can't be too hard - just a couple chairs, a table, some pictures on the wall, and a bed. I put it under my arm and headed for the checkout line.

The puzzle sat lonely and forgotten for several weeks. And then came the first good snowstorm and the suggestion we do a puzzle. So, I broke it out - 1000 dazzling, colorful pieces of torturous agony! Jacque helped for maybe ten minutes before abandoning the mission for several of her favorites in another room. So far, she's completed four 500-piece puzzles - I'm still laboring away.

At first I was still very excited because it was interesting how simple Van Gogh's painting style is - crooked lines, strokes all going the same direction, textures changing from one spot to another, the varied hues of the same colors, his enjoyment of using lots of green, and everything kind of outlined nicely in black. So, the first three days, or maybe four, were not . . . agonizing - just challenging.

But, after all of the chairs and pictures, tables and varied blues of the walls were complete I realized that I had just completed the **easy** part and most of the puzzle pieces were still laying scattered around the table. Which leaves me inventing ways to keep my motivation up. Like naming each type of individual piece I'm looking for. Big foot right with a topper. A narrow-top with two siders. Long tall chopper with a hole in his head and dangling right arm. A squiggly to the right. The famous "four poster". The requisite phrases of "That has to go there!", "It obviously has to go in this neighborhood!", and "This is impossible!" start creeping into my normal conversations with myself.

I read this morning in an old Dear Abby column about what maturity is. There were four benchmarks - the first two were: 1) The ability to stick with a job until it's finished, and 2) The ability to do a job unsupervised. I'm determined to finish that danged puzzle - but I'm also thinking, what the heck - I never said I was mature! But, what else can I do? I can't give up - it's too cold and windy (-35° windchill) to scoop snow. Running at school? Too boring. The trap has been set: Two hundred pieces of the floor left . . . oh, oh! "That's a double with a hook-up! Take that Mr. Puzzle maker!" 198!

Called to Follow Christ

The Gospel lesson Mark 1:14-20 for the third Sunday after Epiphany made me think about how much trust that Simon, Andrew, James, and John must have had in Jesus. In the Gospel lesson it did not appear that the disciples hesitated at all about following Jesus. The passage states that they immediately left their nets and followed Him. The Gospel of Mark does not say if Simon, Andrew, James, and John knew Jesus prior to the invitation to follow or if they just felt in their hearts that they could truly trust

Jesus. It is hard to imagine having enough trust in someone to leave everything you know behind to follow and hope all will be ok. However, this is exactly what Simon, Andrew, James, and John did, they dropped everything they were doing and left the place they knew and put all their trust in Jesus and followed Him.

Just as Simon, Andrew, James, and John were called to follow Jesus, we too have been called to trust and follow. Trusting and following Jesus seems to be easier said then done. In today's world we seem to have our attention being sought by so many other things, which makes it difficult to keep our focus on the one we should be following. Our attention always seems to be drawn towards our phones or the latest social media trend. At times it is difficult for us to take even a few moments away from technology as we are so reliant on it anymore. We have become so reliant on technology that our focus has been taken away from the One who we are called to follow. Instead of listening to Jesus's call to follow Him, we are following the earthly possessions and letting them be our guide and in whom we place our trust. However, we should know that we cannot put all our trust in technology as technology is not always correct or available. How many of us have put our full trust into GPS trusting it to get us where we need to go but then it takes us down the wrong path or at least heard of stories of this happening to others? How about when the internet goes out at home or work, and you are unable to stream your favorite show or complete your job functions? There are many other examples where we have put our trust in technology, and it has failed us. Even when technology fails, we still put our trust in it hoping that it will not happen again, although there is someone else who we can put our trust in that will never fail us.

God is someone we can fully rely upon and put all our trust in. God will never fail us or lead us down the wrong path. Even knowing all this, we still let worldly things take our attention off the One we should be following. During this Lenten season I encourage you to take time to allow your focus to be drawn back to God and to let your heart fully trust God. If possible, fast from technology a few hours each day this Lent and use that time to reconnect with God, taking time to notice all the wonderful things God provides. It may be difficult to do at first, but with God all things are possible. Therefore, siblings in Christ, let us be like Simon, Andrew, James, and John and take our focus and trust off worldly technologies this Lent to follow Jesus Christ more closely.


What you need:

- Scissors
- Parchment paper
- · Baking sheet
- Heart-shaped cookie cutters
- ¼ cup cornstarch
- 1/2 cup water
- Adult help



What you do:

- Cut yarn into 12-inch pieces.
- Place cookie cutters atop a baking sheet lined with parchment paper.
- 3. Combine cornstarch and water in a saucepan. Heat mixture over medium heat, stirring until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and cool to form a "glue."
- 4. Dip each piece of yarn into the mixture to coat completely. Squeeze off any excess.
- Place yarn in the cookie cutters, allowing pieces to cross and loop within the heart. Add more until the cookie cutter is filled and the yarn looks like a heart.
- 6. Remove cookie cutters and bake the sheet for two hours at 150°F, or until hearts are dry and hard.

Mobile Food Pantry ~ Sat., February 3rd

The next Mobile Food Pantry will be held on Saturday, February 3^{rdh} at 9:00 am at the Boone County Fairgrounds. Due to the Covid-19 virus, this will again be set up as a drive-through only. All patrons will need to enter the fairgrounds from the 11th and Fairview entrance. Vehicles will be taken in order of arrival in a designated line. The first vehicle to arrive is asked to follow the road into the fairgrounds and stop and park directly in front of the cones that will be set out. All other vehicles entering that are there for the mobile pantry need to follow in line and wait until you have been asked to do otherwise.

If anyone is coming to volunteer their time, please park in the west parking lot next to the Casey Building. If you are willing and are able to volunteer, please arrive around 8:15 am.

If any volunteers or patrons have any symptoms of illness, please refrain from coming to the mobile pantry this month but feel free to ask someone else to pick up for you.

The Food Bank of the Heartland will provide pre-packaged boxes, along with some other produce and food products. Each patron will be required to take what is already packed in each box.

A specific number of vehicles at a time will be sent down to the distribution area. All people attending must remain in their vehicles unless asked to get out. All cars in the distribution area must remain parked until all of those vehicles are told to move. This is a big change as to how things are generally done so we ask for your patience and cooperation as the volunteers are doing their best.

CROSS OF ASHES

On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, worshipers' foreheads are often marked with ashes in the sign of the cross. The ashes traditionally come from burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. In the Old Testament, ashes were a sign of mourning and repentance. Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus' death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. Reciting Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return."





PRETZELS & LENT

Did you know that the easiest and perhaps most significant Lenten food custom for our time might be to serve a small pretzel to every member of the family with their main meal? It sounds surprising, but the pretzel has a deep spiritual meaning for Lent. In fact, it was the ancient Christian Lenten bread as far back as the fifth century. To remind themselves that Lent was a time of prayer, they shaped their breads in the form of arms crossed in prayer (in those days they crossed their arms over their hearts while praying). Therefore they called the breads "little arms" (bracellae). From the Latin word the Germans later coined the term, "pretzel."

Thus the pretzel is the most appropriate food symbol in Lent. It still shows the form of arms crossed in prayer, reminding us that Lent is a time of prayer. It consists only of water and flour (hard pretzels), thus proclaiming Lent as a time of fasting. Besides, its custom came down to us from the early Christians who had invented it as the bearer of such a great spiritual message. On the last Sunday before Lent, we will be sharing pretzels as a reminder of this ancient tradition and as a way to begin our preparation for the journey of Lent. Please join us on **Transfiguration** Sunday, February 11th!

Biscuits & Gravy Casserole

(Submitted by Connie Becker)
Preheat to 350°F.

Ingredients:

8 count package refrigerated biscuit dough (use large biscuits, such as Grands)

1lb. bulk sausage

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

6 large eggs

½ cup milk

Salt and pepper to taste

1 package peppered gravy mix (2¾ oz—makes 2 cups)

Instructions

- 1. Grease a 13×9 baking dish with non-stick cooking spray.
- 2. In a large skillet, cook the sausage over medium heat until completely browned. Drain off the fat, set the sausage aside.
- 3. Cut each biscuit into 4 pieces and spread over the bottom of the prepared pan in an even layer.
- 4. Add the cooked sausage over the biscuit dough, then sprinkle the cheese over the sausage.
- 5. In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs and milk; add salt and pepper to taste, then pour the mixture all over the casserole.
- 6. Make the gravy according to the package instructions. Pour the prepared gravy over the whole casserole.
- 7. Bake the casserole for 40-45 minutes. (until puffed up & golden brown on top)
