A Baby's Hug

¹At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" ²He called a child, whom he put among them, ³and said, "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. ⁴Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. ⁵Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me. (Matthew 18:1-5)

"We were the only family with children in the restaurant. I sat Erik in a high chair and noticed everyone was quietly sitting and talking. Suddenly, Erik squealed with glee and said, 'Hi.' He pounded his fat baby hands on the high chair tray. His eyes were crinkled in laughter and his mouth was bared in a toothless grin, as he wriggled and giggled with merriment.

I looked around and saw the source of his merriment. It was a man whose pants were baggy with a zipper at halfmast and his toes poked out of would-be shoes. His shirt was dirty and his hair was uncombed and unwashed. His whiskers were too short to be called a beard and his nose was so varicose it looked like a road map.

We were too far from him to smell, but I was sure he smelled. His hands waved and flapped on loose wrists. 'Hi there, baby. Hi there, big boy. I see ya, buster,' the man said to Erik.

My husband and I exchanged looks of 'What do we do?' Erik continued to laugh and answer, 'Hi.' Everyone in the restaurant noticed and looked at us and then at the man. The old geezer was creating a nuisance with my beautiful baby. Our meal came and the man began shouting from across the room, 'Do ya patty cake? Do you know peek-aboo? Hey, look, he knows peek- a-boo.'

Nobody thought the old man was cute. We all thought that he was obviously drunk.

My husband and I were embarrassed. We ate in silence; all except for Erik, who was running through his repertoire for the admiring skid-row bum, who in turn, reciprocated with his cute comments.

We finally got through the meal and headed for the door. My husband went to pay the check and told me to meet him in the parking lot. The old man sat poised between me and the door. 'Lord, just let me out of here before he speaks to me or Erik,' I prayed. As I drew closer to the man, I turned my back trying to sidestep him and avoid any air he might be breathing. As I did, Erik leaned over my arm, reaching with both arms in a baby's 'pick-me-up' position. Before I could stop him, Erik had propelled himself from my arms to the man.

Suddenly a very old smelly man and a very young baby consummated their love and kinship. Erik in an act of total trust, love, and submission laid his tiny head upon the man's ragged shoulder. The man's eyes closed, and I saw tears hover beneath his lashes. His aged hands full of grime, pain, and hard labor, cradled my baby's bottom and stroked his back. No two beings have ever loved so deeply for so short a time.

I stood awestruck. The old man rocked and cradled Erik in his arms and his eyes opened and set squarely on mine. He said in a firm commanding voice, 'You take care of this baby.' Somehow I managed, 'I will,' from a throat that contained a stone.

He pried Erik from his chest, lovingly and longingly, as though he were in pain. I received my baby, and the man said, 'God bless you, ma'am. You've given me my Christmas gift.'

I said nothing more than a muttered thanks. With Erik in my arms, I ran for the car. My husband was wondering why I was crying and holding Erik so tightly, and why I was saying, 'My God, my God, forgive me.'

I had just witnessed Christ's love shown through the innocence of a tiny child who saw no sin, who made no judgment; a child who saw a soul, and a mother who saw a suit of clothes. I was a Christian who was blind, holding a child who was not. I felt it was God asking, 'Are you willing to share your son for a moment?' when He shared His for all eternity. How did God feel when he put his baby in our arms 2000 years ago?

The ragged old man had unwittingly reminded me, 'To enter the Kingdom of God, we must become as little children.'"

Sometimes, it takes a child to remind us of what is really important. We must always remember who we are as children of God and that God calls us to love one another. We are all

The Journey Continues: Athens



This month's city is Athens, which is the capital and largest city in Greece. According to Greek mythology, the city is named after Athena, the ancient Greek goddess of wisdom. The city is full of many ancient temples to different Greek gods, with the most famous being the Parthenon that is

located at the Acropolis, the high point of the city.

At the base of the Acropolis is the Areopagus where Paul gave the speech recorded in Acts 17:16-33. The Areopagus is a prominent rock outcropping. The name Areopagus also referred to the Athenian governing council, later restricted to the Athenian judicial council or court that tried cases of murder, wounding, and religious matters. Because they convened in this location, this is what it is known as today.

According to Acts 17:16-33, Paul was in Athens waiting on Silas and Timothy to join him. Paul was distressed by the many idols in the city. He argued with the Jews in the synagogue, and in the marketplace. Every day he would argue with those who happened to be there, as well as with philosophers, Epicurean and Stoic, regarding the idols. Intrigued by Paul's preaching in the marketplace and the synagogue, he was brought to the Areopagus. In his speech at the Areopagus, Paul acknowledges Athenians' religiosity and points to an altar inscribed to an unknown god. Paul uses this as a starting point to proclaim that the one true God, the creator of all, does not live in temples or need human offerings. Paul explains that God wants all people to seek God and that God is not far from anyone. Paul calls on the people to repent because God has appointed a day of judgment and has given proof by raising Jesus from the dead.

Some people mocked the resurrection while others were curious and wanted to hear more. A few of the people believed in Paul's teachings and decided to follow Paul. Among the people who decided to follow Paul and his teachings was Dionysius, a member of the Areopagus, and a woman named Damaris. Located on the side of the Areopagus is Paul's complete speech from Acts 17.

While in Athens we also toured the Parthenon and the Acropolis Museum. We were given some free time to explore the shopping areas of the Monastiraki Square and the Plaka. On our final morning in Athens a group of us were able to attend the Eucharist service at St. Paul's Anglican Church. Athens was a wonderful city to visit, full of history and art all around.

- **Approve Minutes**: Sara Rasmussen made a motion to approve the minutes of March 18, 2025. Roberta Seda seconded. Motion carried.

Report of Officers

The confirmation affirmation supper will be on Friday, May 2nd. Dorothy Tisthammer's funeral will also be on Friday, May 2nd.
- **Intern Pastor**: Vicar Keith Powell The semester will end on May 16th. He is almost finished with his service hours at the Mission Possible Store. The Lenten Bible study went well. He is looking for another Bible Study to lead this summer or fall.
- **High School Youth Coordinator**: Dorothy Grosch They egged yards on Saturday April 19th. The sunrise service & breakfast went well.

Committee Reports:

- **Faith and Fellowship**: The committee talked about going to Omaha to the Joslyn Museum in June. Then they talked about going to a movie in Columbus and eating at a restaurant. They will decide soon.
- Scholarship Committee: The committee is recommending the following Zion Memorial Scholarship Recipients: Clay Sandman, Madison Gompert, and Addyson Winter. They also recommend Nolan Kruse to receive the Randall & Donna Kruse Scholarship. Chris Nelson made a motion to approve the scholarship nominations. Josh Thayer seconded. The scholarships were approved, motion carried.

Parish Education:

- **Zion Alive**: The attendance has waned. They will be meeting for special events, possibly quarterly, in the future.
- **VBS**: VBS registration is available online, and a QR code has been created. Thanks to Vicar Keith, online payment is now through Vanco (the same online company we use for regular offering). These payments are deposited directly in the VBS checking account. This is going much better than last year.
- **Sunday School**: The last day of Sunday School is April 27th. They will also be singing with the senior choir in worship that day.

First Communion: It went very well with 4 young men receiving on Maundy Thursday. **The Lego Bible-Reading Challenge**: This will end soon. There will be two different winners.

Property & Maintenance:

Bell Tower: Josh Thayer talked with Tommy Heesacker who will do the Bell Tower repairs soon.

Parsonage Fence: The fence will be replaced soon.

- **New Vacuum**: A new vacuum was purchased for \$150. It was recommended that if after using it for at least a month, and Jenny Gompert thinks it is working well, we will order 2 more. This will be done so that there will be a vacuum on each level of the church building.
- **Church & Parsonage Mowing**: Bob Bruland will mow the parsonage and church. The cost will be \$60 per mow (\$30 for each property). He will submit a monthly bill each month and be paid accordingly.
- **Worship**: The Easter Flowers were from St. Edward Floral and they were beautiful! We used flat palms this year, and they were well received. There was a nice crowd for the Good Friday Cross Walk; Wolf Home residents followed the trolley on their bus. The confirmands and graduates will be meeting soon with Pastor and Vicar to plan their special worship services.

Task Force Reports:

Handicap Accessibility Project:

The Leon and Lorna Krab Kraft Memorial Grant application was mailed today, April 22, 2025. We requested funds of up to \$30,000.

The cost of the sprinklers is approximately \$252,000. These can be done over a 3-year period. The sprinklers were NOT included in this grant so that we might apply for those in the future. FYI: The property insurance might go up due to adding a sprinkler system.

Updated Quote with Schindler Elevators is \$157,500 for the elevator alone. The total estimated cost will be \$232,945, which includes a 10% contingency cost.


